Project Update

The City of Saskatoon (City) will be micro-surfacing, also known as Seal Coating, Sturgeon Place, Sturgeon Terrace, and Sturgeon Drive this summer. The road treatment will extend the lifespan of the road and result in a level surface. West-Can Seal Coating has been awarded the contract.

Work is scheduled to begin in July 23, 2017, weather permitting. Yellow, high visibility "No Parking" sandwich boards will be placed on the street 36 hours prior to the work starting and will indicate the day the work is scheduled to begin.

The roadway will be barricaded early on the scheduled day, and there will be no access to driveways, residential homes, businesses and streets from the roadway until the work has been completed and the micro-surfacing has cured.

Should rain delay the work, it will be rescheduled and the signs updated. Last minute schedule updates can be found on the Road Restrictions and Construction Projects map at saskatoon.ca/constructionmap.

The map on the other side of this page indicates the work zone area.

Other Facts About the Project:

- Micro-surfacing is very sticky until it has cured and will adhere to tires, footwear, and clothing. **Please do not walk or drive on the roadway until the micro-surfacing has cured and the barricades have been removed.**
- During construction, large machinery will be used which produces some noise and vibration. Please stay clear of the work zone for your safety.
- In the event of an emergency, emergency vehicles will have access to all households adjacent to the work zone.
- **Please refrain from watering your lawns for the duration of construction, as it will delay the project.**

Frequently Asked Questions

What is micro-surfacing?

Similar to sealing your deck, micro-surfacing adds a thin protective layer of asphalt blended with finely crushed stone to the road surface. This provides an extra layer of wear, seals underlying asphalt and extends the life of the roadway.

Why does the surface appear rough and brown in colour?

When first applied, the micro-surfacing has a rough and grainy texture and is brownish in colour. However, within a short period of time, as vehicles drive on the road, it quickly wears smooth and the colour fades to blend with the existing roadway.

Will there be major traffic restrictions?

During micro-surfacing, the roadway will be closed to traffic. This closure will be in place for approximately 24 hours.

Will parking be affected?

Yes. For households/businesses adjacent to the work in progress, access to on-street parking will be restricted. Alternative parking will need to be used around the neighbourhood. Please remove vehicles from the street by **7:00 a.m.** on the scheduled day.

Will my garbage and recycling collection services be affected?

No. The garbage and recycling collection services will not be affected.

Will the bus routes change?

Bus routes along the construction route may be affected throughout the project. During construction, please check the signs posted for alternate bus stop locations or call Saskatoon Transit at 306-975-3100.

Will rain delay completion of the work?

Yes. Rain could delay the project. If rain delays are experienced, the schedule will be shifted accordingly.

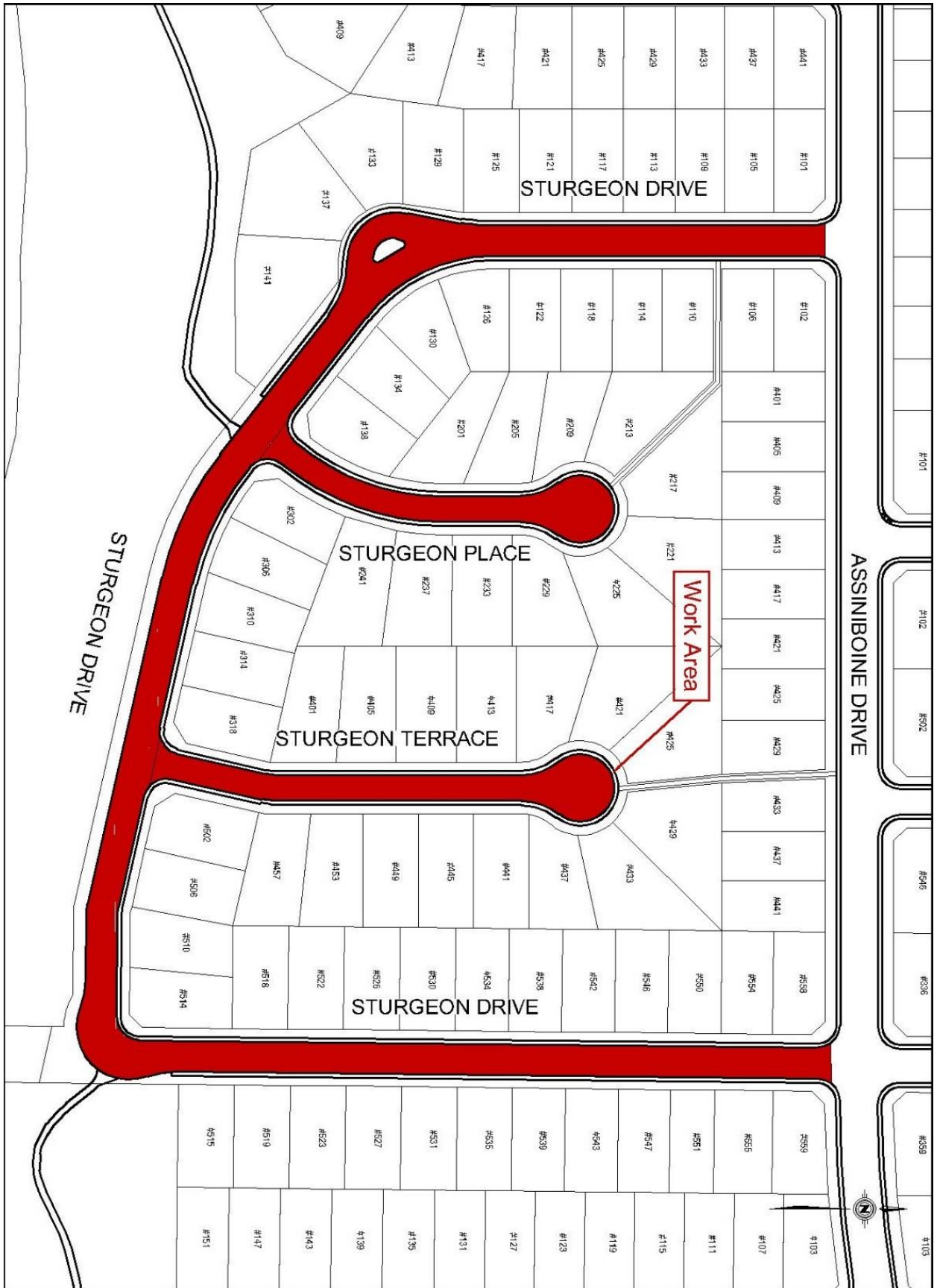
